We helped train more than 120 non-profit housing professionals, allowing them to more effectively and efficiently provide shelter, build housing and provide housing counseling services.

As an organization, we are embarking on our five-year strategic plan with Sharon Legenza, our new Executive Director, at the helm. Sharon brings a wealth of legal skills, housing-related experience and a new perspective to Housing Action Illinois and we're excited about moving forward.

Organizational Overview

OUR MISSION

To increase and preserve the supply of decent, affordable and accessible housing in Illinois for low- and moderate-income households.

OUR VALUES

Housing is a human right. We believe in a society that promotes basic human needs such as decent and safe housing for all of its members. Public policy and government spending should ensure that the basic housing needs of all people are met.

OUR VISION

To create an environment where all Illinois residents, including people with the lowest incomes, have a voice in housing policy and community development. We seek to bring together community stakeholders such as residents, businesses, and government to work together to increase the supply and availability of affordable housing across the state.

OUR MEMBERS

Nonprofit organizations, local governments, for-profit companies, and individuals from across Illinois who care about affordable housing. Membership in Housing Action Illinois provides a direct link to people across the state and the country with common concerns. Members also receive reduced registration fees at our annual convention and other workshops throughout the year. Member organizations also have voting rights at our Annual Meeting.

CONTACT INFORMATION

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2007 Accomplishments

- Secured a 5% increase for the State Emergency Food and Shelter Program, which funds overnight shelters and transitional housing.
- Amended the Safe Homes Act to protect more victims of domestic violence and sexual assault who are renters and need to end their lease or get their locks changed.
- Worked with groups across the country to secure passage of the National Housing Trust Fund in the House of Representatives.
- Organized a six-stop caravan through east central Illinois to meet with affordable housing advocates to discuss statewide responses.
- Coordinated and promoted more than thirty public education events around the state in November for Affordable Housing Month, a 100% increase over 2006.
- Coordinated creation and publication of a report of the 11 HUD-certified Counseling Agencies that participated in the HB 4050 Predatory Lending Database ('PLD') Pilot Program regarding the services they provided under the Pilot Program. The report found that many borrowers did not understand the terms of the loans that they were getting and that loan terms were often unaffordable and misleading for borrowers. Press coverage of the report led to positive program changes.
- Provided technical assistance to ten non-profit developers, six of which have since developed or are in the process of developing 80 units of affordable housing in Illinois, and four of which have increased their capacity to develop or manage housing.
- Offered five two-day development workshops as part of our Community Housing Developers Institute attended by over 40 participants from across the state.
- Offered a five-day Train the Trainer Methods in Pre-purchase Education and a two-day Beginning to Intermediate Foreclosure Training resulting in 80 NeighborWorks certified housing counselors from across the state.

Looking Ahead

- We will continue to provide training and advocacy efforts that help prevent foreclosures and stabilize neighborhoods.
- We will continue to advocate for \$100 million in annual funding for affordable housing in Illinois' capital budget.
- We will advocate for state legislation to protect seniors from reverse mortgage predatory lending practices.
- We will continue to provide workshops and one-on-one technical assistance to nonprofit
 affordable housing developers and housing counseling agencies.
- We will co-coordinate the participation of Illinois' housing advocacy community through the Housing Roundtable.
- We will adopt and implement the four main components of Housing Action's new 2008 - 2013 strategic plan;
 - · Expand membership and increase involvement in program activities.
 - · Increase recognition of the Housing Action Illinois brand and identity.
 - · Increase the long-term financial sustainability of Housing Action Illinois.
 - Improve our ability to tell our story and show the impact of our work and that of our members.


